Thanks to all the Program Directors who submitted articles describing innovative, exciting summer programs and events such as "Space Camp" (University of Colorado – Boulder), "Talking and Listening with Preschoolers," and "Speaking and Signing Stories," (University of Northern Colorado), "Augmentative Camp," (Montrose Memorial Hospital), and intensive summer group programs (Children's Speech and Reading Center – Fort Collins and Memorial Hospital – Colorado Springs).

Other special summer events included a trip to Colorado Springs to attend a traditional Masonic Cornerstone Ceremony laying the cornerstone for the Memorial Hospital for Children. Vern Ingraham, Valerie Hernandez and I were impressed with the interest and enthusiasm of the community for this meaningful observance which replicates the ceremony presided over by Mason and President George Washington for the laying of the cornerstone of the Capitol in Washington, D.C., on September 18, 1793. The ceremony elucidates the Masonic values and encourages observers to reflect upon the demonstration of these values in their everyday life.

Nine Colorado RiteCare participants attended the Biennial RiteCare Conference in Washington D.C. August 28-30. This ever popular conference brings together RiteCare clinicians, Masonic Board members, and program administrators from more than 170 RiteCare clinics in the Southern Jurisdiction of Scottish Rite Freemasonry.

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The program held "something for everyone" including tracts on "Administration,"
"Literacy," and "Speech-Language Pathology."
A highlight of the conference was the tour of the "House of the Temple," home of The Supreme Council, 33°, Ancient & Accepted Scottish Rite of Freemasonry, Southern Jurisdiction, Washington D.C., U.S.A. This magnificent building, occupying a full city block in Washington D.C., is rich in Masonic symbolism and artifacts. The Philanthropy Room reminds us that Masons contribute extraordinary time and money in helping their fellow man through RiteCare clinics and other worthy causes.

In July, the Board of Trustees approved a major fundraising program to enhance our work in all corners of the state. The "Architects of Care Campaign" is envisioned to raise \$2.0 million from Masons, other philanthropies, and interested parties, and will help us help more children throughout the state. 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Four graduate scholarships in speech-language pathology were awarded this past summer. The *Dwight A. Dwight passed away in 2005 and served as President of the Scottish Rite Foundation of Colorado from 1995 to 2005.

She has worked as a toddler teacher and substitute teacher at elementary schools in Leadville, Colorado. Laura became interested in speech-language pathology three years ago when her youngest son was diagnosed with a language disorder. Another Great Summer at CSRC!

Children's Speech & Reading Center just wrapped up another exciting summer, continuing their individual therapy sessions and their work on the autism grant, while also providing small groups for Preschool Speech and Language Skills, Kindergarten Readiness, and Preparing for 1st grade. The Center also conducted an intensive eight-week literacy intervention curriculum, utilizing approaches from the LiPS and Wilson programs. Surveys completed at the end of the program indicated that parents noticed an improvement in their child's attitude toward reading, feel better equipped to help their child with reading, spelling, and comprehension, and feel better equipped to communicate with their child's teachers about their child's needs. CSRC plans to continue this model as funding allows.

We are looking forward to a busy fall. Two new speech-language pathologists will be joining our staff in September: Jessica Davis, a recent graduate of Indiana University, and LeAnn Sipple, who has 10 years of experience in pediatric speech-language pathology. In addition to her caseload at the center, Jessica will be running the early literacy program at Thompson Valley Preschool. Elise Kormas, Director, will be running the program at United Day Care, where a head start class will be seen in addition to the class that we already see. LeAnn hopes to add pediatric feeding and swallowing clients to her caseload. Karen, Monica, and Nicole will continue to focus on literacy, developmental speech and language disorders, apraxia, and autism.

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More News from the University of Colorado Speech Language and Hearing Center RiteCare Partnership Summer Programs

"Space Camp" is an inclusive group intervention designed to support peer interaction and social communication among children ages 6 to 9 with Autism Spectrum Disorders (ASD) and their typical peers. This is the second summer that Space Camp has been held at the Speech Language Sciences Center at CU Boulder, and we are thrilled to announce that this summer the children with needs received scholarships to attend provided through the generosity of the Scottish Rite Foundation.



Children often share a common interest in the area of space exploration, and many of our children with high-functioning Autism or Asperger's Syndrome demonstrate a particular interest and extensive knowledge in this area. In Space Camp we capitalize on this common interest to heighten the children's motivation to work cooperatively with peers during "Team Missions." Supported by a graduate clinician in the Master's Program in Speech-Language Pathology, a child with ASD and his or her typical peer create a project together, such as a "light scope," or play a game, such as "catch the planet." During these projects and games the graduate clinicians facilitate the children's joint attention skills, skills that are the foundation of social communication and peer interaction.

Beyond the intensive "Team Mission" peer interaction, children are supported to engage in joint attention with their peers and to build pragmatic language skills during outside physical play, large group "Astronaut's Meeting," indoor dramatic play related to space, and one-on-one "show and tell" with a less familiar peer. Generalization of social communication and peer interaction skills is supported through field trips to the Fiske Planetarium and the Sommers-Bausch Observatory on the CU campus. 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Let's Listen was a group for one and two year old children with hearing loss. It met twice weekly for seven weeks during the summer of 2008. All children in the group used hearing aids or cochlear implants to help support their audition. Therapy was incorporated into a meaningful play-based environment. The focus of intervention for the children in the group was functional auditory skill development, though speech development. language development (both signed and spoken), and social skills were also targeted. To increase auditory training, an adapted Speech Perception Instructional Curriculum and Evaluation (SPICE) were used. This curriculum focuses on developing listening skills for children with cochlear implants and hearing aids. Each of the children in the group had goals created based on their current abilities and the Functional Auditory Performance Indicator (FAPI) was used to monitor and assess their auditory skills.

UMMER GROUPS

El Grupo del Sol was a group for four and five year old children with identified speech and language delays who are monolingual Spanish-speakers or bilingual Spanish and English-speakers. The group met four days per week for two weeks during the summer with a focus on kindergarten readiness and speech/language skills. Goals were created for each child in their identified areas. Therapy was incorporated into free play, storybook reading, and snack. The clinicians used modeling, mirroring (repetition), expansion (repeating and adding onto what the child said), self-talk (talking about what the clinician is doing), and reflecting (talking about what the child is doing) to help facilitate the use and development of language. Language development was targeted in three languages, Spanish, English, and ASL, depending upon the student and their needs. Early literacy skills were also addressed with a focus on repeated exposure to books, print referencing, and development of phonological
