The new and improved Scottish Rite Foundation of Colorado website is now operational. It presents the Foundation and RiteCare program information in an organized, attractive, and easy to use format. It doesn't require a lot of clicks to get the information. If you haven't visited the new site since it was uploaded January 9, 2010, please take a moment and do so.

The site is best viewed using Google Chrome as the application viewing software. Internet Explorer will work, but Google Chrome is better and it is downloadable from Google free of charge.

Jim Martin III, Ph.D., made the new site a reality and did all the coding and uploading of the web pages. But he did much more than this by adding real value to the utility of the site including a new location mapping strategy for the RiteCare partner location maps, insertion of an email button on various key pages, and enhancing the site's color scheme and ease of navigation just to name several enhancements.

The home page is confined to a menu of main section page titles with links. This is in stark contrast to the former website which had a lot of imposing narrative on the home page. Our three mission components – speech therapy, treasure chest, and graduate scholarships – have separate and distinct pages. Each of these pages is identified by title and a unique photo layout.

The website has a warm appearance in color scheme and ease of navigation. Being designed with our prime users in mind – the families of children with language disorders, graduate students at UNC and CU, and current and prospective donors – all information is presented and layered so as to minimize the number of times one must go from page to page in search of specific information. The website also provides for on-line donations using **PayPal**, a new addition not available on the former site.

By clicking on the RiteCare Partner Location Map (in either the Speech Therapy or Early Language pages) an interactive Google map is displayed with each RiteCare location highlighted by a blue pin symbol. The user can zoom in on a map location obtaining a good quality aerial view, see the location in a typical Google map format, or change to a topographic or even a street map. In fact, for most locations the user can also convert to a Google Earth street scene and see a 360 degree photo of your location. This is a dramatic improvement over the former site which only offered a static non-interactive map.

Finally, as you know I am preparing a narrative description of the work of each RiteCare partner. These narratives will be posted as PDF files and located with the respective RiteCare Partner's address and contact information. The PDF file for The Children's Hospital is now available and posted. The UNC PDF will be available shortly. Narratives for CU and St. Mary's are being reviewed by the respective RiteCare Directors and should be ready for website posting in the near future. In addition, this RiteView newsletter will be posted and available for viewing through the Foundation Information page.

The program provides audio-visual feedback for patients focusing on speech acquisition, rate, and articulation. The Visipitch also allows therapists to gain objective data on voice parameters including pitch, volume, and clarity and includes several rewarding games to make speech and voice therapy fun and interactive for pediatric patients.
