RiteCare Conference a Resounding Success!

More than 200 participants attended, representing RiteCare programs in 28 states. Conference evaluations were overwhelming positive (all components of the conference rated at 4.35 or higher on a 5.0 scale). The educational sessions and posters were outstanding, and the Gala Dinner and Program highlighted our sustaining relationship with Scottish Rite Masons. I am grateful to so many colleagues who stepped forward to make this conference a success! Perhaps we'll be asked to do it again in another 20 years...

There are several important updates for RiteCare and Treasure Chest programs this fall. <u>First</u>, we will not be publishing an annual calendar for 2017. After discussing the uptake of previous calendars by Masons, clinicians, and families (we typically had several hundred calendars "left over" every year), and the calendar expense, we decided to forego this publication. Thanks to all RiteCare and Treasure Chest programs who participated in the past by submitting such uplifting photos of children and families. I treasure them all.

<u>Second</u>, in a previous e-mail (9/8/2016) to RiteCare and Treasure Chest Program Directors, I described a new initiative approved by the Scottish Rite Foundation Board of Trustees entitled *Community Benefit Grants*. This initiative will allow RiteCare Clinics and Treasure Chest Programs to engage more fully in their community by providing free programs that enhance childhood language and literacy development. These free programs would be offered to all families in the partner's community, regardless of healthcare insurance or economic status. Examples of programs that the partners might offer include: Free speech and hearing screenings; Parent education programs on enhancing language and literacy development for preschool children; Community education conferences that include parents and professional in dialogue about community options and needs, among others. Look for another e-mail from me shortly to describe this exciting new program more fully with specific instructions on how to apply for these grants (applications will be due by January 13, 2017).

Scottish Rite Program Expands Access to Essential Speech Therapy

MONTROSE, CO: Over 100 attendees visited Buckley Park in Montrose for a picnic celebrating patients of the *RiteCare* program.

Established by the Scottish Rite—charitable arm of the Masons—the program expands care to families in Montrose and Delta by increasing access to Mountain View Therapy's speech therapy services. The picnic featured a BBQ meal, clowns, face-painting and balloon animals for the various pediatric patients and their families who are assisted by the program. Specifically, the program aids families whose insurance does not cover the cost of speech therapy services—often due to developmental delays.

For the Scottish Rite, the picnic is a celebration that makes their program feel "real."

"It puts a face to the people we're trying to help," said Bill Kledus, a Scottish Rite member who organized the event. "I can see the parents, grandparents, the caregivers and the kids- it all comes together in the picture. When we have the meetings, we have the first name. We never see the child, or the care giver. So to at least put a smiling face to it...it helps us see who we're helping."

According to Patti Anderson, a Speech Language Pathologist at Mountain View Therapy who works with pediatric patients regularly, the program is important for bringing essential services to young patients who would otherwise not get the care they need.

"We're delighted by the work the Scottish Rite performs each year to increase access to the high-quality pediatric care delivered by Mountain View Therapy at Montrose Memorial Hospital," said Steve Hannah, MHA, CEO of Montrose Memorial Hospital. "We're proud to work with them to increase the health status of our community."

The Scottish Rite Foundation of Colorado's mission is to enhance the quality of life for Colorado's children and their families by supporting high quality, collaborative programs for the prevention and treatment of childhood language disorders. The foundation is a 501(c)3 public charity that has spent \$37 million on speech-language services, including \$849,000 in 2015.

Gunnison Valley Update and Community Event

Pediatric speech therapy at Gunnison Valley Hospital continues to grow thanks in part to support from the Scottish Rite. Even in a relatively small population center there are many children who can benefit from speech therapy to improve their lives now and in the future. Historically families are limited by awareness and sometimes finances. The Scottish Rite has helped to minimize the financial concerns allowing us to focus on awareness.

The Pediatric Therapy team has continued to spread the word about speech therapy to the Gunnison Valley by attending Back-To-School Nights, meeting with preschool directors, preschool teachers and hosting field trips with local preschools to play and see our pediatric therapy space. Our GVH team has also partnered with the school district to participate in Child Find Screening Days meeting with families to ask them questions from the ASQ and screen in all areas for occupational, speech and physical therapy by providing ideas, feedback and recommendations. This past Saturday Gunnison Valley Hospital hosted the first annual Pumpkin Patch, a free community event focused on activities for families and children.

The pumpkin patch featured face painting, a bouncy house, balloon animals, marshmallow roasting, ambulance tours, horse petting, yoga and much more. Over 500 members of the community came out to take part in this event. The Pediatric Department set up an obstacle course, played tongue twisters, and applied hundreds temporary tattoos (which were a big hit!!). Local Scottish Rite Mason Paul McCabe assisted the pediatric department immensely by talking with children and families and volunteering as our GVH tattoo artist for the kids.

Going forward, Gunnison Valley Hospital is also looking into the need to expand pediatric speech services to Crested Butte. Special thanks to the Scottish Rite and especially Paul for continued support or our program and community.

Our family was devastated when we discovered that our insurance would not cover any form of speech therapy. Knowing that early intervention is very important when it comes to improvement of such a diagnosis our family did not know what direction to take. We heard about CLC through local community members. Although we knew it would be a perfect fit, we had no idea how we were going to cover the cost of tuition. Our family recently relocated to Colorado and while we are adjusting to our new environment, we are a single income household. Family members agreed to pay for our sons first semester at CLC but could not guarantee any additional support. During the end of his first semester, his teacher told us about a scholarship opportunity from the Scottish Rite Foundation.
