The Pediatric Program offers services to the community for children who attend the Gunnison-Watershed School District, Early Intervention services, Adaptive Sports, homeschool students, visitors and second homeowner families. We not only serve our own patients but provide support and supplement other local programs and daycare centers as we are the only entity for families to receive additional therapy services in the area. This program serves the entire community, not a competitive but a collaborative way to offer better care for residents and families in our community.


The Pediatric Rehabilitation Program is diligently working on a Concussion Protocol to provide education, assessment, services, consultation and a continuation of care for the patient and their families who suffer a head injury. Due to the active outdoor lifestyle in our community, the occurrence of head injury is on the rise and early detection is vital. The Pediatric Program is working closely with nurses, doctors, therapists and administration in order to devise a program that will benefit the patient and the caregiver with immediate feedback, recommendations and a therapy plan that can be followed that aligns with the school Return to Learn program.
