Parents of young children who stutter are often very fearful that their child will have a lifelong speech disorder. They typically do the exact opposite of what they should do to help their child decrease his/her dis-fluent speech. Rather than ask their child to slow down, the parent should model a slower, easier way of talking and listen calmly and wait for him/her to finish talking before responding. Asking a lot of questions, talking loudly and rapidly, and rushing interactions are other behaviors to avoid.

Every Monday, I evaluate a child who is new to our program due to concern about some aspect of speech and language development. Recently, both parents brought their son for such an assessment. A few days after the evaluation visit, the child's mother sent an astonishing message, which you will see at the end of this article.

This boy was about to have his third birthday. Despite receiving state-funded Early Intervention services in his home once a week for over one year, and despite his parents completing a parent training course, this boy's ability to communicate using spoken words increased from just 7 to 10 words.

The ability to use 7 different single words is something we typically would expect in a child around 15 months of age. Such a small vocabulary is completely inadequate to a nearly three-year-old child who understands well, wants to communicate, and appears to have normal intelligence. Adding only 3 words is a very poor gain over one year of intervention. During our visit, we made three very good discoveries during trial therapy:

- This boy could and would imitate speech sounds, though hesitantly.
- He caught on immediately to the process of exchanging small pictures to receive items, a much more practical augmentative communication method than sign language to communicate with people who aren't familiar with his signs.
- He was highly responsive to my speech and language modeling techniques, which increased his ability and motivation to attempt to speak. His parents were impressed by the success of these methods, which were new to them.

Now, here is the astounding event that occurred at home a few days later. After the visit, I provided the boy's parents with our packet of information explaining the next steps before therapy can be scheduled. Attached to that packet is the application for a Scottish Rite Foundation grant. At home, the boy saw the packet, pointed to the Children's Hospital Colorado logo, looked at her, and signed "more". She felt he was indicating that he wanted to come back.

With the help of the Scottish Rite Foundation, at Children's Hospital Colorado, we can help children learn to communicate.

In 2014, the CLC or Speech Language Hearing Center RiteCare program intends to support those children and families needing scholarship support for their children's therapeutic programs in the CLC. This includes a special summer offering for parents of children born with Down Syndrome called "Early Circles", which will support parents as they navigate the many challenges of having a new member of their family with special needs. Parent to parent connections as well as continued support to learn early strategies for language and literacy development will facilitate parents' skills as they support their children's growth and development. We are so grateful to the Scottish Rite Foundation for its never-ending support of our children who need services in our evidence-based and inclusive toddler and preschool programs.

Kudos to the Scottish Rite Foundation, who also recognized three of our exemplary graduate students with scholarships in 2013. These scholarships significantly support financing of graduate students' continued education.

NEW LANGUAGE GROUP!

Children's Hospital Colorado in Colorado Springs is excited to announce the start of Cleft Lip & Palate Clinic at their Briargate Network of Care location. At the Cleft Lip & Palate Clinic, children and their families are seen by a variety of professionals, including ENT, plastic surgery, dentistry, social work, audiology, and speech language pathology to determine their plan of care. This clinic has seen several children over the course of the last two months. Families have expressed excitement and satisfaction with being able to receive these services locally as part of a collaborative team. We look forward to continuing to provide the best care for children with cleft lip and palate!

Colorado Springs is springing into a new language group. This language group was developed to help meet the needs of families with young children (ages 18 months to 3 years) with language delays. The group meets once a week for 12 weeks to address not only the delays of the children but to educate parents on ways to maximize speech and language learning at home and in their daily routines. While the children are receiving direct speech and language therapy, another therapist is working with the parents. The parents are given the tools to help their children develop and meet their full potential. The group has finished one round with great success and is starting their second round this spring.
