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# Scottish Rite Foundation of Colorado Celebrating 60 Years!



### Treasure Chest Program - Cortez

Greetings from the Treasure Chest Program at the Piñon Project Family Resource Center in Cortez!

This summer, The Treasure Chest Program collaborated with two community programs to provide information and access to the literacy tubs and materials. The *Montelores Early Childhood Center for Family Night*, was held on July 18, 2013 at Centennial Park in Cortez. Summer themed literacy tubs including books, toys and activities were made available for families to check out at the event.

The second event was organized with the *Parent's As Teachers Program* Coordinator, Maggie Tivault for the *Kid's Olympics at ParQue De Vida* held in Cortez on July 26, 2013. There was a great turnout from families where parents and their children (ages birth-8 years), participated in outdoor games and activities followed by a family picnic.

Lori, who is a Family Support Specialist at The Pinon Project, participated with her children Kaiden age 2 and Kadence age 7 (right). Lori also assists with the *Parents As Teacher* family events. Her children have enjoyed The Treasure Chest Program literacy tubs for the past two years, since Kaiden was 6 months old. Kaidence will enter first grade this year and she loves reading with her little brother.





Another family pictured here on the left (Delaney-mom, Emily age 4 and Landyn, age 2), have been involved with The Treasure Chest Program for over a year. This year they are participating with *Parents As Teachers* home visits. Mom reports that both children have been showing really noticeable gains in language and other areas of development! As a single mother of two children under 5 years old, she greatly appreciates having quality books and materials available at no cost. She enjoys time with her kids while knowing this is helping with their development and early literacy skills.

Mom says she would not be able to afford to purchase the materials herself on her current income. There is also limited transportation to the local library. Delaney has encouraged other young moms to participate in both programs and is herself a supportive community peer.

In honor of the 60<sup>th</sup> Anniversary for the Scottish Rite Foundation of Colorado, I would like to thank the Scottish Rite Masons of Colorado and RiteCare on behalf of all of the families that we serve here in Montezuma and Dolores Counties. Due to the generous support, The Treasure Chest Program is able to continue promoting early literacy skills, school readiness, and encourage positive parenting practices.



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### Children's Speech and Reading Center, Ft. Collins

The Ft. Collins community established a RiteCare program with The Scottish Rite Foundation of Colorado in 1998.

As professionals, we know well the dramatic affect our work can have on the little clients we treat, but there are times we are reminded of how communication delays/disorders can affect the children's loved ones.

Sean began therapy at the Children's Speech and Reading Center (CSRC) in June of 2011. At this time, he was 3 ½ years old and was very hard to understand. Diagnosed with Apraxia, he presented with a number of speech sound errors, deleting final consonants (e.g., "mat" would be pronounced "ma"), deleting initial consonants (e.g., "chair" would be pronounced "air"), deleting syllables in words (e.g., "balloon" would be pronounced "hoo") as well as others. These errors made it very difficult for Sean to be understood by family and friends. Often, when unsuccessful in conveying his message, Sean would simply give up and walk away. This inability to communicate caused great frustration and worries for the family, and unfortunately was often the trigger for fights between Sean and his siblings.

Sean made quick progress and in September of 2012, he was discharged from therapy having met all of his goals! His speech intelligibility improved a great deal and his articulation skills were in the average range for his age. During the fifteen months of weekly therapy Sean and his family were a delight to work with and the staff at the Center forged a strong relationship with them. It has been nearly a year since Sean was discharged and the family often comes by to visit. Sean still runs up to his therapist, Sarah, with a big hug!



"Prior to coming to CSRC, Sean (left) was a frustrated child. We were frustrated parents. We could not understand what Sean wanted or needed. His speech was very delayed and we were very worried about his future. After his first evaluation at CSRC a lot of our fears were laid to rest. We knew he had serious speech delay (apraxia) but that he could overcome it. We came weekly throughout the summer and into the fall. This spring he has been coming twice a week. The improvement in his speech over the last year has been remarkable. His behavior and confidence improved tenfold with his ability to communicate. Without the funding from the Scottish Rite, our family would have struggled to get him into private therapy... Thank you so much to CSRC for improving Sean's life, as well as the rest of the family." – Sean's Family

Robert shares, "Serving on the Appraisal Committee has been a tremendous and very rewarding experience for all of us. When we see little kids who cannot communicate or really struggle to communicate when they enter our program, and graduate with the ability to communicate, and see the joy and excitement on their and the parent's faces, it really warms the heart. There is no higher calling than helping a little child and giving them a second chance in life."

#### Five Graduate Students Receive Speech-Language Scholarships in 2013

Five graduate students in speech-language pathology received scholarships this year and will be recognized at the September 16, 2013, meeting of Denver Consistory. The scholarships were awarded to second year graduate students in speech-language pathology attending the University of Northern Colorado (UNC) and the University of Colorado at Boulder (CU-Boulder).

Since 2003 when the Scottish Rite Foundation of Colorado implemented the graduate scholarship in speech-language pathology, 40 scholarships totaling \$200,000 have been awarded through 2013. Each scholarship is for \$5,000 and awarded to students who plan to work in Colorado upon graduation. The Foundation's scholarship is named for Dwight A. Hamilton, former Sovereign Grand Inspector General in Colorado (1994-2005) and then-president of the Foundation.

Alexandra Bresler, graduate student at UNC, and Miranda Aragon, Noell Mitchell, and Sarah Gyory, graduate students at CU-Boulder, each received the \$5,000 *Dwight A*. *Hamilton Scottish Rite Foundation Graduate Scholarship in Speech-Language Pathology*.

Upon graduation from UNC, Alexandra Bresler plans to work with diverse populations of preschool-age children with speech-language disorders in Colorado. She states, "I strive to persistently exhibit integrity, perseverance, a strong work ethic, and passion."

Upon graduation from CU-Boulder, Miranda Aragon plans to work with low-income families in early intervention in Colorado. She states, "I am passionate about this population because of my interest in family-based intervention."

Upon graduation from CU-Boulder, Sarah Gyory plans to provide speech therapy services in Colorado's public schools working with young children. She states, "They inspire me to take risks toward betterment, but need me to be the careful one, the safety net."

Upon graduation from CU-Boulder, Noelle Mitchell plans to provide speech therapy services in a school setting in Colorado. She states "I look forward to working with children in this setting."

In addition, we are again pleased that a Colorado graduate student has been awarded the Supreme Council's Sam and Millie Hilburn Scholarship in the field of Childhood Language Disorders. The 2013 Colorado recipient is Angela Wuelling, a graduate student at CU-Boulder. She is the sixth Colorado recipient of this prestigious scholarship. Having six Colorado students as recipients to date speaks highly for the quality of education in this field at CU-Boulder and UNC.

The therapists James has seen have been wonderful to work with him and are very patient with him.

They read books together and do activities so that he thinks they are just having fun and doesn't realize they are working. We are also given assignments to do at home which he also enjoys.

In the last year and a half, since receiving therapy, James' language has really turned around. We can now understand almost everything he says and have identified specific sounds that he needs to work on.

James has received a scholarship form Scottish Rite Foundation since the beginning of his therapy. The therapy has been life changing for James and without the help from Scottish Rite I don't know what we would have done. We will always be thankful for what Scottish Rite and the therapists at Children's Hospital Colorado have done for our family." - With sincere appreciation, James' Family
